



Adrian Wolfberg is currently a visiting professor of policy and strategy at the U.S. Army War College, Carlisle, PA, and a research associate with the Doctor of Management Programs, Weatherhead School of Management, Case Western Reserve University.

He has served in various capacities with the United States federal government since the early 1980's. He began his public service career as a naval flight officer aboard carrier-based reconnaissance jet aircraft. He graduated from the Weatherhead School of Management at Case Western Reserve University with a Ph.D. in Management (Designing Sustainable Systems). He has a M.S. in National Security Strategy from the National War College, a M.S. in Systems Management from the University of Southern California, a B.S.-equivalent in Mathematics from the University of South Carolina, and a B.A. (Honors) in Individualized Studies specializing in the Transformation of Modern Culture from York University (Canada).

In one of his assignments from 1997-2002, Adrian was the production manager and editor for an Executive Office of the White House interagency series of studies. The studies, produced semi-annually, required the input, coordination and consensus of 13 agencies across five executive departments of the U.S. federal government, and were used by the U.S. President and Cabinet Officers to make resource decisions. In this capacity, he was asked by a U.S. Cabinet Officer to convince a foreign President to change his mind about a policy antithetical to the interests of the U.S.; the foreign President acquiesced. In a recent assignment from 2005-2010, Adrian has assessed and designed organizational and cultural change through the Knowledge Lab. Adrian's professional life and his academic research have touched upon the challenges of and strategies used in transferring knowledge to decision makers.
